Field Secretaries



GEORGE GREEN was born in London. Went to Canada 1894. Licensed to preach by First Baptist Church, Woodstock, Ont., 1899. Graduated from Woodstock College, June, 1901. Came to Richmond, Va., and entered Medical College of Virginia September, 1901. Received M. D. degree May, 1905. Attended Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. Appointed November 17, 1906, to Ogbomoso, Nigeria, West Africa, the first medical missionary sent to Africa by Southern Baptists. From the time of his appointment until October 16, 1935, when he was elected as Secretary of Nigeria, he was engaged in medical and evangelistic work. As Secretary of Nigeria he has general oversight of all Southern Baptist work in Nigeria.

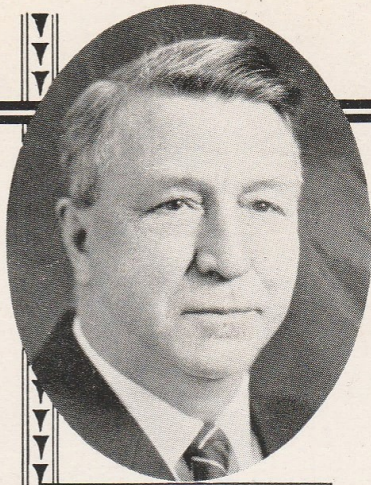
LYDIA WILLIAMS GREEN was born in Norfolk, Va. Attended private schools in Norfolk. Graduated from Norfolk College (Mary Washington College) 1900. Married George Green, January 9, 1907. Appointed January 19, 1907. Assisted her husband in medical work until 1911, when home and maternal duties claimed a large part of her time, but did work with women and children of Ogbomoso churches. Because there are no schools for white children in West Africa, taught her four children, preparing them for high school in America. Her work is among women and children, aiding especially the Woman's Missionary Union of Nigeria, Ogbomoso.

WILLIAM CARY TAYLOR was born in Mayfield, Ky. Early in life he dedicated himself to Christian service. He attended Bethel College, receiving his B. A. degree in 1905. Graduated from Southwestern Seminary with Th. M. degree. Did graduate work in Princeton. From the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary he received the Th. D. degree in 1915. For a time he served as a missionary under the Northern Home Mission Society in Comanche, Okla. He was appointed May 14, 1915, to Brazil and has served as dean of our Baptist College and Seminary at Pernambuco; editor, publisher, author, pastor and traveling evangelist. In October 16, 1935, he was elected as Secretary for Latin America. He has general oversight of the work in Brazil, Argentina, Uruguay, Chile and Mexico.

GRACE CISCO TAYLOR was born in Bardstown, Ky. The call to the mission field came when she was thirteen years of age. She completed the course at Bardstown Baptist Institute. Attended Georgetown College and Southwestern Baptist Training School. Married W. C. Taylor, November 13, 1913. Appointed May 14, 1915. Taught in primary department of Collegio Americano Baptist for several years. Was first principal of the Woman's Training School in Pernambuco. Her generous hospitality and ministry in the home has been a genuine service to missionaries and guests from the homeland.

MILLARD THERON RANKIN was born at Newberry, S. C. He was graduated from Furman University in 1918; attended Wake Forest College. Graduated from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. Appointed June 8, 1921, and for many years served in Graves Theological Seminary, Canton, China. On October 16, 1935, he was elected as Secretary for the Orient. He has charge of the work in Japan and our four missions in China. His office is located at Shanghai, China.

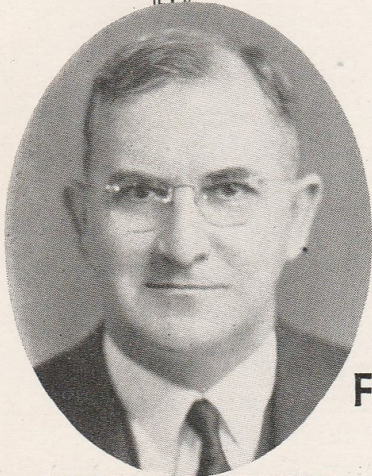
VALLERIA GREENE RANKIN was born in Canton, China, the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. G. W. Greene, for many years Southern Baptist missionaries in South China. She attended Oxford College, Mars Hill College. She also took pedagogical work at Meredith College. Graduated from the Woman's Missionary Union Training School in 1919. Appointed June 10, 1920. Married M. T. Rankin in China, March 7, 1921. In addition to her many home duties she served in the Woman's Training School at Canton. Her home and missionary duties are very important and exacting in Shanghai.

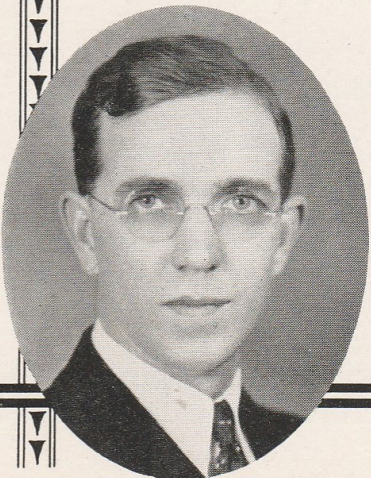

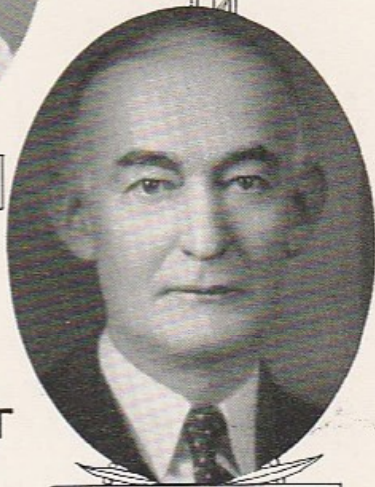

AFRICA

SUSAN ANDERSON was born in Haversham County, Ga. Converted at age of sixteen. Graduated from Woman's Missionary Union Training School, Louisville, Ky. Assistant to pastor First Baptist Church, Charlotte, N. C., two and half years. Was Corresponding Secretary of Woman's Missionary Union of Georgia, 1918-'19. Resigned February, 1919, to join class in Yoruba Language study; taught in Baltimore, Md., by Dr. S. G. Pinnock our missionary from Abeokuta, Africa, who was in America on furlough. Appointed December 19, 1918, for evangelistic and educational work. Has taught in the Girls' School in Abeokuta through her entire term of service. Abeokuta.



LIONEL RAYMON BROTHERS was born near White Plains, Ky. In 1910 he moved to Bartow, Fla., where he graduated from high school in 1923. He graduated from the University of Florida in 1927 with the B. A. degree, and from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1930 with the Th. M. degree. From George Peabody College for Teachers he received the M. A. degree in 1931. Taught school three years and served part-time pastorates. For two years he preached full time. Appointed April 19, 1936. Educational work. Ogbomoso.

LEOLA SMITH BROTHERS was born in Macon, Ga. Graduated from high school in Attapulgus, Ga., in 1923. Spent four years at Georgia State Woman's College, graduating in 1927 with the B. A. degree. After teaching two years, entered the Woman's Missionary Union Training School, where she graduated in 1931 with the B. M. T. degree. In August, 1931, married L. Raymon Brothers. Did B. Y. P. U., Sunday School and W. M. U. work in local churches. Appointed April 21, 1936 Educational work. Ogbomoso.



ELMA ELAM was born in Madison, Mo. Her early life was one of Christian training. Converted at the age of twelve. Graduated from Madison High School and from La Grange College, Mo. While in La Grange College she heard the call to definite religious work. After graduating from Woman's Missionary Union Training School, she entered William Jewell College, receiving B. A. degree, May, 1923. Appointed June 14, 1923. Educational and evangelistic work. Shaki.



WILLIAM H. CARSON was born near Sheffield, Ala. Converted at age of seventeen. Received B. A. degree from Howard Payne College in 1914. Attended Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, finishing with Th. M. degree, 1917. Appointed December 19, 1918, for educational work. Served several years as principal of Baptist College and Seminary at Ogbomoso. He is now doing Bible training and evangelistic work among four tribes in Niger Delta, where the great River Niger empties into the Atlantic Ocean. A launch and car is used in this difficult work. Sapele.



GRACE SCHIMMEL CARSON was born in Birmingham, Ala. Her grandfather, Schimmel, who was converted under preaching of John Oncken, in Germany, came to America, 1868. She was converted at age of ten. Took course in music. Attended Judson College. Received diploma in voice and teacher's certificate in piano, 1912. Married W. H. Carson, September 16, 1914. Graduated from Woman's Missionary Union Training School with B. M. T. degree, 1916. Appointed December 19, 1918. Started work in Day School in Ogbomoso, 1924. Assisted in Sunday School and Woman's Missionary Union work. Bookkeeper for two schools. Is now doing evangelistic work among women and children. Sapele.

A. C. DONATH was born in Deanville, Burlison County, Texas. Converted at the age of twelve and felt called of God to preach. After years of resisting, yielded to the call. Entered Baylor University in 1920. Received B. A. degree in 1924; in fall of 1924, entered Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. Received Th. M. degree from that institution in 1927. Volunteered for mission service in Africa but finances of Board prohibited appointment at that time. Accepted the pastorate of First Baptist Church of Mart, Texas, and gave many years of service there. Appointed October 16, 1935. Evangelistic work. Shaki.



CHRISTENA BREAZELLE DONATH was born in Bertram, Texas. Converted at the age of thirteen and volunteered for foreign mission work in Africa. Attended Baylor University, graduating with the B. A. degree in 1924. Graduated from Baylor School of Nursing. Married A. C. Donath, August 22, 1927. Hoped to go immediately to Africa, but the finances of the Board prohibited appointment at that time. Appointed October 16, 1935. Shaki.



HATTIE MAE GARDNER was born near McBee, S. C. Attended Clyde School. Converted at the age of seventeen. First missionary impression came in 1918. Definite surrender to missionary service made in April, 1928. Attended Campbell's College, Buie's Creek, N. C., two years. Graduated from Coker College with B. A. degree in 1932. Graduate work done in University of North Carolina. Engaged in mission work in mill districts. Conducted Daily Vacation Bible School; taught in B. Y. P. U. Training Institutes and in mission study classes. Appointed October 16, 1935. Educational work. Shaki.



FRANCES CARTER JONES was born in Owensboro, Ky. The desire to become a missionary came to her as a little girl and stayed through the years. Attended public schools in Hampton, Va., Newberry and Edgefield, S. C. At twelve was converted and baptized by her father, Rev. Pendleton Jones. For two years she attended Coker College. Received B. A. degree from Westhampton College, 1924. Taught French and Latin five years. 1929 entered Johns Hopkins Hospital and in 1932 she received the R. N. degree. From graduation until appointment, did institutional work in Johns Hopkins Hospital. Appointed April 21, 1936. Medical work. Ogbomoso.



RUTH MAY KERSEY was born in Hanover County, Va. Converted at the age of nine. Attended the public schools of her county, John Marshall High School and Woman's College in Richmond. She graduated from Woman's Missionary Union Training School with the B. M. T. degree in 1916. In 1920 she received from the Retreat for the Sick, in Richmond, the R. N. degree. Appointed June 10, 1920. Besides her work as a nurse she directs the care of motherless babies who are brought to the hospital. Ogbomoso.



LENA V. LAIR was born in Anna, Texas. Received early education in the Anna public schools. Converted at the age of ten. Two years later came the call to religious service and in a short time the definite surrender to foreign mission work. Graduated from Anna High School. Attended Baylor University. She received from that institution the B. A. degree. Then entered the teaching profession. Several years later she attended Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, receiving the M. M. T. degree in May, 1934. Appointed October 16, 1935. Ogbomoso.



ELKIN LIGHTFOOT LOCKETT was born in Hays County, Texas. Attended State Teachers' College; University of Chicago; and Southwestern Training School. Married Dr. B. L. Lockett December 7, 1915. Appointed December 16, 1915, to Oyo. Later she and her husband resigned because of the illness of the children. Received B. A. degree 1925 from Simmons University. Reappointed October 15, 1925. Assisted Dr. Lockett in medical and evangelistic work. Dr. Lockett died November 13, 1933.



LEONARD LONG was born in Prague, Oklahoma. Converted at the age of twelve. Joined the Prague Baptist Church, and immediately was elected superintendent of the Sunday School. Often led in prayer meetings. He received a diploma from Prague High School in 1924, and the B. A. degree from Oklahoma Baptist University in 1928. From Oklahoma University Medical School, he received the B. S. degree in 1930, and the M. D. degree in 1932. Three years later he answered God's call to mission service. Appointed April 19, 1934. Medical work in the Baptist Hospital, Ogbomoso.

FLORENCE MAJOR LONG was born in Fenton, Michigan. Her early education was received in the public schools of Fenton. She is a graduate of the Fenton High School. In 1934 she graduated from Grace Hospital Nurses' Training School in Detroit. Married Dr. Leonard Long, April 14, 1934. Appointed with her husband on April 19, 1934, to medical work in the Baptist Hospital, Ogbomoso.



KATHLEEN SENTER MANLEY was born in Morristown, Tennessee. Converted at nine years of age. Graduated from Morristown High School in 1924. Received the B. A. degree from Carson-Newman, 1928; graduated in 1931, with R. N. degree from Baptist Memorial Hospital Training School, Memphis, Tenn. Did private nursing until 1933, when she was made Superintendent of Mossy Creek Hospital. Medical work, Ogbomoso.



HUGH PENDLETON McCORMICK was born in Mineola, Texas. His parents moved when he was eight years of age to Bogue Chitto, Miss. Attended public school in that town. Converted at the age of sixteen. Entered Mississippi A. and M. College in fall of 1914, and graduated in 1918. From August, 1918, to January, 1919, he was in the U. S. Army. Taught in the schools in Las Cruces, New Mexico. Served as agriculturist and adviser in Boliver County, Mississippi Agricultural High School 1919-1920. In September, 1919, volunteered for missionary service. Appointed July 15, 1920. Served first in the Industrial School at Iwo, now engaged in evangelistic and educational work. Ogbomoso.



MARY REEKS McCORMICK was born in Jackson, Louisiana. Educated at Scarlett Bible Training School; Tulane University. Received R. N. degree from Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore in 1924. Married H. P. McCormick, January 21, 1925. Appointed June 10, 1925, to educational work in Ogbomoso. She is now rendering faithful service in evangelistic and medical work, Ogbomoso.



EWART GLADSTONE MacLEAN was born in Cambridge, N. B., Canada. Educated in local schools; graduated from Baltimore College of Dental Surgery, 1901. Went to Africa to practice dentistry in 1901. Appointed on the field November 8, 1907. Practiced dentistry and opened the Industrial Mission School in Iwo. Supervises a dispensary which makes life more livable for many suffering people in Iwo. Has charge of the Boys' Industrial School, which is self-supporting from the sale of house, church and school furniture, to an area of about a hundred miles. Organized evangelistic work, has always held first place in Dr. MacLean's heart. Iwo.



ANNIE BRIGGS MacLEAN born in Cambridge, N. B., Canada. Graduated from Provincial Normal School. Went to Africa in 1902 to teach. Appointed November 8, 1907, on the field. Married E. G. MacLean in 1908. Assisted in opening and helps to run the Industrial Mission at Iwo. Much of her time is given to the work of the dispensary. Has personal charge of feeding motherless babies and others who are undernourished. She often prepares and feeds the more difficult cases every three hours until others can be trusted to follow directions. She seizes every opportunity to spread the gospel in and around Iwo.

IRA NEWBERNE PATTERSON was born in Tuscaloosa, Ala. Early in life was converted and soon decided to be a missionary. Attended Baptist Collegiate Institute. Received B. A. degree from Harvard College in 1921 and the Th. M. degree from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1924. Appointed July 10, 1924. Labored first in Sapele. Has engaged for a number of years in general missionary work with emphasis upon evangelism. Abeokuta.



SARA LEE BOBO PATTERSON was born on a farm in Laurens County, S. C. At age of six entered rural school. High school education completed at Owings High School. Converted at age of fifteen. Graduated from Anderson College in 1921. During sophomore year at Anderson surrendered to the call to foreign mission service. After teaching two years attended Woman's Missionary Union Training School, graduating in 1924. Married Ira Newberne Patterson, June 16, 1924. Appointed July 10, 1924. First work in Sapele. Now helps her husband in evangelistic work. Abeokuta.



J. CHRISTOPHER POOL was born in Grapevine, Texas. Was converted at the age of eleven. Attended Grapevine High School, graduating with second honors. Attended Baylor University, from which institution he graduated with B. A. degree in 1929. Received the Th. M. degree from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, 1932, and Ph. D. degree in 1934. Appointed April 19, 1934. Educational work in the Seminary. Ogbomoso.



ELIZABETH ROUTH POOL was born in San Antonio, Texas. Converted at the age of ten years. Volunteered for the foreign field at the age of sixteen. Received B. A. degree from Baylor College, 1930. Taught two years in San Marcos Academy. Appointed April 19, 1934. Evangelistic and secretarial work in Ogbomoso. Married J. Christopher Pool in December, 1935. Ogbomoso.



MAY EDGEL PERRY was born in Tate, Georgia. Moved to Talking Rock a few years later, where she attended the public schools. Converted at age of thirteen. When seventeen entered Georgia Normal and Industrial School, graduating in 1912. Received first definite call to foreign field while in Georgia Normal and Industrial College. From Woman's Missionary Union Training School, she graduated with the B. M. T. degree in 1920. Appointed June 10, 1920. Evangelistic and Woman's Work. Abeokuta.



JULIUS CARLYLE POWELL was born near Warsaw, N. C. Educated in county high school and Wake Forest College. Graduated from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1919. The accidental death of his friend, John Anderson, in China, led him to the decision to volunteer for foreign mission service. Appointed June 11, 1919. Evangelism has been his field of work through the years. Shaki.

ROSE HOCUTT POWELL was born in Ashton, N. C. Converted at the age of fourteen. Her first impression for foreign mission service came while she was in Delway High School. Attended Meredith College. In 1917 the final decision was made to volunteer for foreign mission work in Africa. Appointed June 11, 1919. Married J. C. Powell in July, 1919. Evangelistic work. Shaki.



LUCILLE REAGAN was born in Coleman, Texas. Moved to Big Spring when two years old, where she received her early education. Attended Simmons College. From Baylor University she received the B. A. degree in 1919. She received B. M. T. degree from Southwestern Theological Seminary. Appointed June 8, 1921. Evangelistic and educational work. The Academy in Lagos, with its many students, presents opportunity for testifying to unsaved souls from Mohammedan and heathen homes. Heathen villages nearby provide openings for evangelism. Lagos.





EVA MILDRED SANDERS was born in Roanoke, Va. Early education was received in Roanoke schools. She graduated from Westhampton College with B. A. degree in 1924; from Jefferson Hospital School of Nursing with the R. N. degree in 1927. Entered Woman's Missionary Union Training School in fall of 1927 and graduated with the B. M. T. degree in 1929. Appointed July 23, 1931. Her work is educational, evangelistic and medical. Lagos.



H. GLENN WALKER was born at Beatrice, Okla. At eleven years of age was converted. D. T. Gardner led in a special service in which his life was dedicated to mission work. Graduated from high school in 1923 and from Wayland Baptist College in 1927. From Baylor University he received the B. A. degree in 1929. The M. D. degree was received from Baylor Medical College in 1935. Taught school during 1930. Appointed April 21, 1936. Medical work. Ogbomoso.



MARY BALDOCK WALKER was born in Denison, Texas. Converted at the age of eight years. The desire to be a missionary came to her in early childhood. Graduated from North Dallas High School in June, 1929. Spent one year in Burleson College. Held the position as stenographer for several years. Married H. Glenn Walker, December 24, 1933. Appointed April 21, 1936. Medical and evangelistic work. Ogbomoso.

RUTH WALDEN was born in Roanoke, Va. Converted at the age of twelve. Surrendered to the call to service on the foreign field when she was thirteen. Graduated from Murray High School and Averett College. Attended Westhampton College. From Woman's Missionary Union Training School she graduated with B. M. T. degree in 1929. Did work on B. A. and M. A. degrees at Peabody College, while Young People's secretary for Tennessee. Appointed April 19, 1934. Educational and evangelistic. Abeokuta.



NEALE COVINGTON YOUNG was born in Ebenezer, S. C. Attended Southern Seminary, and Winthrop College. Received B. M. T. degree from Woman's Missionary Union Training School, June, 1920. Appointed June 10, 1920. Is president of Woman's Missionary Union, one of the strongest religious organizations in Nigeria. She brings once a year, leading women who are active in Woman's Missionary Union work, to headquarters in Ogbomoso for a course of two weeks' intensive training. Holds classes for the women in all sections of Nigeria. Travels hundred of miles, organizing and encouraging Woman's Missionary Societies throughout the Nigerian Mission. Abeokuta.



ARGENTINA



MARTIN STONE BLAIR was born in Martindale, Texas. Attended Baylor University 1903-1906. Bookkeeper and bank clerk 1906-1909. Received B. A. degree from Baylor, 1912; graduated Southern Baptist Theological Seminary with Th. B. and Th. M. degrees, 1917-18. Served under Baptist State Board of Kentucky two and one-half years. Chaplain U. S. Army latter months, 1918. Appointed July 10, 1919. First work was evangelistic in city and Province of Cordoba; City of Rosario, Provinces of Cordoba and South Santa Fe. Present work is in co-operation with South District Church, which begun in Blair home, in tent and open-air preaching and other forms of evangelism. Rosario.



CORA HANCOCK BLAIR was born in Kathleen, Fla. Graduated Lakeland grammar and high school. Attended Columbia College and Dade City Normal. Taught three years. Entered Woman's Missionary Union Training School, graduating with B. M. T. degree, 1915. Served two and one-half years under Baptist State Board, Kentucky, among colored people. Married Martin S. Blair, September 20, 1916. Appointed July 10, 1919. Present work: Co-operating with the church and out stations; holding Summer Bible Institutes for girls and with night classes for both sexes. Rosario.

GEORGE A. BOWDLER was born in Santiago, Chile. Father and mother natives of England. Educated in England, returned to Chile, 1904. Converted at age of seventeen, followed by strong conviction of call to Christian work. Came to United States in 1909. Attended Union University and University of Minnesota. Graduated from Des Moines Baptist College, 1916; graduated also Department of Religious Education, Chicago. Attended Southern Baptist Theological Seminary one year. Appointed June 11, 1919. Established Boys' School in Buenos Aires. Educational and evangelistic work. Cipolletti.



RUTH NICHOLSON BOWDLER was born in Carlisle, Iowa. Attended Carlisle Baptist Church and it was there that she was converted early in life. Graduated from the public schools of Carlisle. Attended Woman's Missionary Union Training School one year. Married George A. Bowdler, January 30, 1919. Appointed June 11, 1919. Has assisted her husband through the years in educational and evangelistic work. Cipolletti.



VERNON LEROY DAVID, son of Rev. and Mrs. W. J. David, former Missionaries to Africa, was born in Meridian, Miss. Was converted at the age of five and joined the church when he was six years old. Attended Baylor University. Received B. A. degree in 1917. Graduated from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary with Th. M. degree, 1917. Appointed December 5, 1924 to educational and evangelistic work. Barcelona, Spain. Resigned November 23, 1933. Reappointed October 16, 1935. Evangelistic work. Buenos Aires.



ARA MANNING DAVID was born in Torreon, Mexico. Was converted when seven years of age. Educated in the schools of Texas. Studied voice and piano in several cities of Texas. 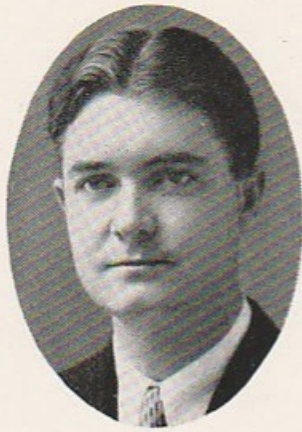

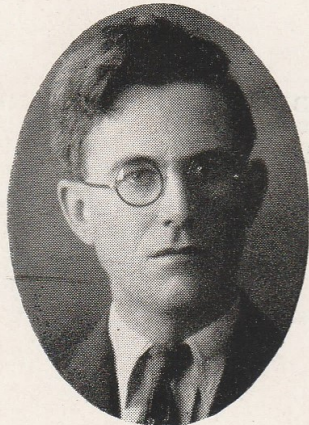

IRENE JEFFERS was born at Roanoke, Alabama. Converted at the age of eleven years. She planned a career as a teacher. For several years taught in the winter and attended summer school at the University of Alabama. Attended Valparaiso University and Peabody College. From State Normal School at Florence, she graduated in 1919. She entered in 1920 the Southwestern Baptist Training School and graduated in May, 1923, with M. M. T. degree. Appointed June 14, 1923, educational work in girls' school, Yangchow.



PEARLE JOHNSON was born at Mt. Vernon Springs, North Carolina. 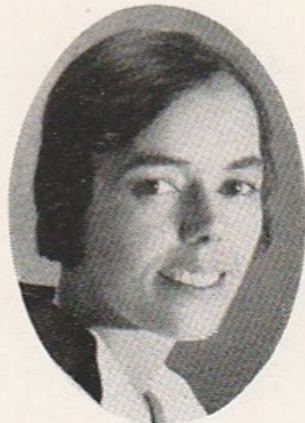

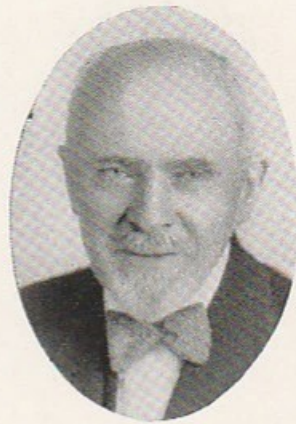

DEAVER MONROE LAWTON, son of Dr. and Mrs. W. W. Lawton, was born in Kuling, China. Converted at the age of twelve years and joined the Chengchow Baptist Church. Graduated from the Shanghai American school. Came to America and entered Furman University. Graduated from Erskine College with B. A. degree, 1930, and from Baptist Bible Institute received the B. C. T. degree in 1932. Worked among Chinese in New Orleans while attending Baptist Bible Institute. Appointed October 16, 1935. Educational and evangelistic work, Laichow.



OLIVE ALLENE LAWTON was born in Chinkiang, China, the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. W. W. Lawton. Converted at the age of eleven and joined the Baptist church at Chinkiang. From the time of her conversion she felt called to labor in China as a missionary. When she finished high school she attended the American school in Shanghai. Came to America in 1918 and entered Winthrop College. Graduated in 1922 with B. A. degree. From Woman's Missionary Union Training School she graduated in 1924. OLA VADEN LEA was born near Ringgold, Virginia. Converted at the age of fourteen. Early in life surrendered to the call to mission service and began preparation for the foreign field. Did teachers' training work in East Radford State College. Attended Virginia Intermont College, received A. A. degree in 1923. Received B. M. T. degree from Woman's Missionary Union Training School in 1924, and the B. A. degree from University of Louisville in 1934. Appointed June 10, 1925. First work was educational and evangelistic in Soochow. Now engaged in educational and evangelistic work. Shanghai.



CHARLES A. LEONARD was born in Statesville, North Carolina. Graduated from Wake Forest College in 1907 with B. A. degree. Received the Th. FLORENCE COKER LIDE was born in Darlington, South Carolina. Influenced by her mother and Sunbeam leaders, she felt the call early in life to foreign mission service. Graduated from Winthrop College with B. A. degree in 1904; from the Woman's Missionary Union Training School she received the B. M. T. degree in 1912. Took special course at Columbia University in 1921-22. Appointed July 8, 1913. Is engaged in evangelistic, educational and administrative work. Has charge of women students in North China Seminary. Hwanghsien.





FRANCIS PUGH LIDE was born in Darlington County, South Carolina. Attended Clemson College, receiving B. S. degree in 1918. He served in the U. S. Marines in World War and spent some months with the Army of Occupation in Germany. Returning to America he entered Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, receiving the Th. B. degree, 1926; Th. M. degree, 1927; and the Th. D. degree in 1928. Appointed June 10, 1920. His first term of service was given to evangelistic work; second term beginning 1928—teaching in North China Seminary, Hwanghsien.

BETTIE STEPHENS LIDE was born in Greenwood, Missouri. Pioneered with her parents in Oklahoma. Graduated from the State University of Oklahoma with the B. A. degree in 1914 and received the M. Lide after she reached China, December 23, 1920. Assists her husband in his work in North China, Hwanghsien.



JANE WILSON LIDE was born in Darlington County, South Carolina. She heard in childhood from her mother and Miss Eliza Hyde's Sunbeam Band stories of missionaries and mission fields. During senior year in college she joined the Student Volunteer Band. Graduated from Winthrop College with B. A. degree in 1901. Attended Woman's Missionary Union Training School one year and from Hartford School of Religious Education received the degree of Master of Pedagogy in 1919. Appointed May 27, 1909. Her work has been educational and evangelistic. Has written several books, which were published by China Baptist Publication Society. Hwanghsien.

ELIZABETH ROSE MARLOWE was born near Williamsburg, Kentucky. Converted at the age of thirteen years. When seventeen she dedicated her life to mission service in China. Attended Kentucky State School. Received the B. A. degree from Cumberland College. Graduated from Woman's Missionary Union Training School with the B. M. T. degree in 1921. Appointed June 8, 1921. Educational and evangelistic work in Cantonese school, Shanghai.



CLIFFORD J. LOWE was born in Harris County, Georgia. Converted at the age of twelve. He was educated in the schools of Macon, Georgia. Surrendered his life to foreign mission service while a member of a large Bible class taught by Rev. R. V. Miller, of Macon, Ga. Attended Mt. Herman School, Northfield, Massachusetts. Went to China under the Bible Missionary Society, November, 1908. Appointed by the Foreign Mission Board, January 1, 1910. Evangelistic and educational work. Shanghai.



JULIA MARTIN LOWE was born in Brooklyn, New York. Converted when she was thirteen years of age. From early childhood she was interested in foreign mission work. Educated in high school and normal schools of New York. She taught for three years in the public schools of Brooklyn. Married C. J. Lowe, November 5, 1908, and sailed with him to South China under appointment of the Bible Missionary Society. Appointed by the Foreign Mission Board, January 1, 1910. CREAD C. MARRIOTT was born near Booneville, Missouri. Converted at the age of ten years and at the same time felt the call to the ministry. It was not until he was eighteen that he was able to begin preparation for his life work. CHARLES G. McDANIEL was born in Nottoway County, Virginia. Attended William and Mary College; received B. A. degree from Richmond College in 1897 (now University of Richmond). Attended Rochester Theological Seminary. University of Richmond conferred upon him the D. D. degree, 1928. Appointed January 21, 1902. Has spent his entire missionary life in and around Soochow. Organized Yates Academy and church in 1905. Teacher and administrator in Yates Academy since its organization. Bought the land, planned and supervised the erection of mission buildings in Soochow. One of the founders of the University of Shanghai and member of its Board of Managers. Member of Executive Committee of Board of Managers of China Baptist Publication Society. Finds time to do evangelistic work. Soochow.



NANNIE BARTLETT McDANIEL was born in Warwick County, Virginia. Attended Hampton public schools. Graduated from high school in Wakefield, Massachusetts, and Southwest Virginia Institute (now Virginia Intermont College). Took private courses of study for which she received no credit. Appointed January 21, 1902. Married C. G. McDaniel, April 9, 1902. Went to China from a busy life in her home town because she felt that God had called her to the work of a missionary. Works with the primary children of the Sunday School and with the women in the church and with the poor children in the neighborhood on Sunday afternoons. Since 1928 the need in Wei Ling school has been so great that she has helped in the teaching. Soochow.

HENRY HUDSON McMILLAN was born in Wagram, North Carolina. Prepared for college by his father and sister, entered Wake Forest—graduated in 1908 with B. A. degree. Principal of Fruitland Institute two years. In 1909 was ordained to the ministry. Graduated from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1913 with Th. M. degree. In 1920 received Th. D. degree. Appointed July 8, 1913. Evangelistic work in and around Soochow. Has charge of Goodwill Center, the chapels and outstation churches. Much time is given to short-time Bible schools. Emphasis is placed on the distribution of Christian literature and open air evangelism. Soochow.



LELIA MEMORY McMILLAN was born in Whiteville, North Carolina. Early education received in Whiteville schools. Graduated from the high school. Attended Meredith College, received the B. HELEN LOUISE McCULLOUGH was born in St. Louis, Missouri. From early childhood believed that she would some day become a missionary to a foreign field. In 1920 a definite call came to the work in China. Graduated from Houston High School in June, 1919. Entered Moody Bible Institute in 1919, graduating in 1921. Received B. ROBERT E. LEE MEWSHAW was born in Garland, Texas. Converted at the age of thirteen and at the same time felt the call to Christian service. Surrendered to the call in 1912. Graduated from Garland High School. Received the M. D. degree from University of Texas in 1908. Appointed June 14, 1916—first work in Kwelin. Resigned in 1926 because of war conditions in Central China. Reappointed October 16, 1934. Medical and evangelistic work. Yangchow.



DELL SPENCER MEWSHAW was born in Terrell, Texas. She was educated in the public schools of Tehuacana and Garland. Attended Sam Houston Normal, received her diploma in 1904. Taught at Calegro Moreles, Mexico, one year, and two years in Garland. Married R. E. L. Mewshaw, July 3, 1907. Appointed June 14, 1916. Resigned in 1926 because of unsettled war conditions in Central China. Reappointed October 16, 1934. Medical and evangelistic work. Yangchow.

JAMES WALTON MOORE was born in Murphy, North Carolina. Converted and called to preach when he was about twenty years of age. Received B. A. degree from Simmons College in 1916, and the Th. G. degree from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1919. Appointed June 10, 1920. His work in China has been both educational and evangelistic. He is head of Girls' School and the Boys' School and is general evangelist and director of the Chefoo Field. Much time is given to revival meetings and to general evangelistic work in the city and in the many out stations in the country districts. Chefoo.



MINNIE FOSTER MOORE was born in Eastland, Texas. Attended Texas State University and Simmons University. Was married to J. Walton Moore on September 23, 1917, and went with him to Louisville, where she took a course at the Woman's Missionary Union Training School. 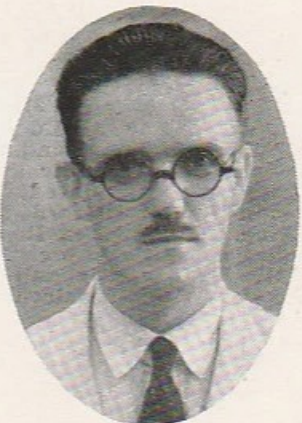

A. Biblical degree in 1917. Served in the United States Army as chaplain during the World War. Appointed September 13, 1919. Appointed by the American Presbyterian Mission Board in 1917 to Hinan Island, China. Married Rex Ray, November 11, 1920. Appointed by the Foreign Mission Board June 8, 1921. Evangelistic and educational work among the women and children. Wuchow.



OLIVE RIDDELL was born at Tabscott, Goochland County, Virginia. Early years were spent on a farm with parents who believed in attending church. Educated in high school and State Normal. From Woman's Missionary Union Training School she received the B. M. T. degree in 1919. At the age of twenty she felt the call to foreign mission service. Appointed June 11, 1919. Her first term of service was in Pochow. After her second furlough, she located at Kweitch. She spends much time teaching the women to read the Bible. In order to do this she travels over a large territory organizing and holding classes for women and girls. Kweitch.

ANNIE JENKINS SALLEE was born in Waco, Texas. From Baylor University she received the B. S. and the M. S. degrees. LEONORA SCARLETT was born in Florence, Canada. Moved with her parents to Michigan. After completing the grammar school she took a business course in Detroit Business University, and held a position as a stenographer for several years. Converted at the age of eighteen and felt the definite call to missionary service as a nurse—the way was opened for her to receive the nurses' training. Appointed June 3, 1910. Her first work was that of a nurse in Wuchow. She is now doing evangelistic work in Kong Moon.

Shiuchow.



GRACE BOYD SEARS was born in Victoria, Australia. Converted at the age of nineteen. Through the reading of "Chinese Millions" she felt the call to mission work in China and entered Angas College, where she completed the course. She went to China as a member of the China Inland Mission for work in girls' schools and among the women. Upon her marriage to W. H. Sears she was appointed by the Foreign Mission Board October 9, 1906. Dr. W. H. Sears died August 5, 1922. Evangelistic and educational work. Pingtu.

MARGIE SHUMATE was born in Simonsville, Virginia. Graduated from Virginia Interment College with the B. A. degree; and from Woman's Missionary Union Training School with the B. M. T. degree. Appointed June 16, 1914. Her address is given at Shiu Hing but her chosen field of labor is Sun Hing, a county in the hills. Evangelistic work has taken her to a people to whom no one has ever gone with the Gospel message. Her privilege is to go in and out among these multitudes proclaiming Christ's redeeming love. 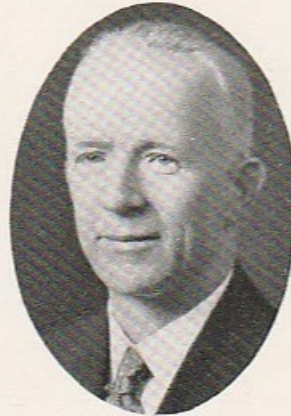

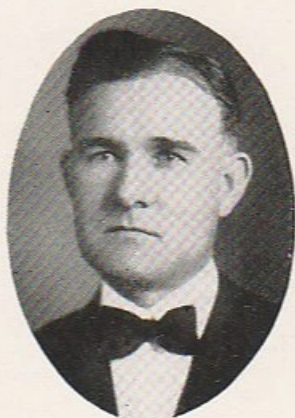

MATTIE NORMAN WHITE was born at Hertford, North Carolina. Graduated from Meredith College in 1921; took the summer course at the New York School of Music and Fine Arts, and spent one year at Woman's Missionary Union Training School. During this last year she felt the definite call to the foreign mission service. Married Philip E. White, June 17, 1924. Appointed July 10, 1924. Reappointed July 25, 1935. Evangelistic work. Chengchow.

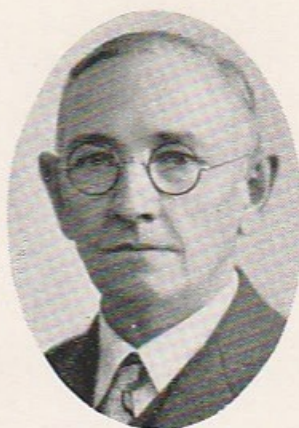
